





Health Care Workers



Health care is the second-fastest-growing sector of the U.S. economy, employing over 12 million workers. Women represent nearly 80% of the health care work force. Health care workers face a wide range of hazards on the job, including needlestick injuries, back injuries, latex allergy, violence, and stress. Although it is possible to prevent or reduce health care worker exposure to these hazards, health care workers actually are experiencing increasing numbers of occupational injuries and illnesses. Rates of occupational injury to health care workers have risen over the past decade. By contrast, two of the most hazardous industries, agriculture and construction, are safer today than they were a decade ago.





Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS)

Severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS) is an emerging illness which was identified in China in late 2002, and has now spread throughout the world. Although there have been very few cases of occupationally acquired SARS in the United States, NIOSH recognizes the potential for spread of the disease within the workplace, especially for workers who experience daily contact with the general public, such as health care, medical transport, and airline personnel, as well as those who deal directly with potentially SARS infected material, such as laboratorians. The following topic page is designed to present general information about the disease, increase awareness of safety precautions and work related issues, and provide links to additional information for workers and employers.
